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We are well into the season of Lent and I would like to remind you of the thoughts in the last Ametur about taking "another way", a "different road" in life's journey, in imitation of the Magi. Lent gives us the opportunity and the encouragement to pursue that different way as we journey along our pilgrim path to God. As the ashes were placed on our heads we heard the words: "Remember that thou are dust and unto dust thou shalt return", or "Repent and believe the Gospel." The Gospel is our way of life, our "different way". In the Wollongong Catholic Diocesan Lenten Program, *Hope*, Shane Dwyer wrote in the Foreword, page 4:

"Lent is a purpose-built opportunity to re-find our way.

We take a look at the landscape and ourselves in it,
and focus again on what is at the heart of our faith:
the hope that we hold in the redemption won for us,
and the reorientation of purpose offered to us
in the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus."

In just a few weeks we will be celebrating the Feast of all Feasts, Easter, and I would like to share with you some thoughts from Pope Francis regarding our preparation for this grace-filled feast. He said that in order for good Christians to have a "good Easter" they must "enter into the mystery" of the **Easter Triduum** and make Jesus' feelings and attitudes their own. This is exactly what we, as members of the Chevalier Family, are all about — learning from Jesus so that we, too, can act like Jesus, and actually **be** the Heart of Jesus on earth. (The Easter Triduum begins on Holy Thursday evening and concludes on Easter Sunday evening.)

During the Mass on *Holy Thursday* evening there is the symbolic gesture of the washing of the feet, when we are called anew to a life of service to our brothers and sisters. Jesus, the Suffering Servant, gave us the example throughout his life, especially at the Last Supper and through his suffering and death, of the great importance of service. Pope Francis said that:

"If we receive Holy Communion without being open sincerely to washing each other's feet, we do not recognize the Body of the Lord."



The second day of the Triduum, *Good Friday*, recalls how Jesus "transformed the greatest iniquity into the greatest love" with his sacrifice on the cross, the Pope said. He went on to dwell on the significance of Jesus' last words on the cross: "It is finished."



"They mean that the work of salvation is accomplished,
that all of the Scriptures find their complete fulfillment in the love of Christ.

How beautiful it would be if all of us,
at the end of our lives, with our mistakes, our sins,
even with our good works and our love for our neighbor,
can say to the Father as Jesus did, 'It is finished.'
Not with the perfection [of Jesus] but saying,
'Lord, I did everything that I could. It is finished'."

On *Holy Saturday*, the church identifies with Mary and contemplates Christ in the tomb, after the "victorious battle of the cross". The Pope continues:

"In the darkness that envelopes creation, she remains alone to keep the flame of faith lit, hoping against all hope in the resurrection of Jesus. Sometimes, the darkness of night can penetrate the soul and we think, 'there is nothing left to do,' and the heart no longer finds the strength to love.

But it is in this very darkness that Christ lights the fire of the love of God."



The Pope said the great mystery of *Easter* is that

"the stone of pain is rolled back, leaving room for hope."
As Christians, we are called to be sentinels of the morning,
who know how to see the signs of the Risen one,
like the disciples at the tomb on Easter morning."

I came across this beautiful reflection on Daniel O'Leary's website — *Learning Heart*- taken from St Benedict's Bulletin Easter 1999.

# 3<sup>RD</sup> INTERNATIONAL MEETING OF THE LAITY OF THE CHEVALIER FAMILY

The Lay members of the Chevalier Family are dedicated women and men who have been attracted to Father Chevalier's Charism and Spirituality of the Heart through one of his three religious groups – Missionaries of the Sacred Heart, Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart and the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart.

As members of the world-wide Chevalier Family our mission, as we well know, is "to be on earth the Heart of Christ" by living out a Spirituality of the Heart through prayer, through the promotion of peace, justice and the integrity of creation, and in healing broken relationships and divisions in our own personal lives and in our society.

Chevalier Lay Associates come from 52 countries throughout the world. In 1995 and 1999 they held their first Meetings in Issoudun, France, our founding place and the home of Father Chevalier for most of his life. In 2008 a 2nd International Meeting was held in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic. It is with great joy that we have received news of the 3<sup>rd</sup> International Meeting. The details of the 3rd Meeting are as follows

## Sao Paulo, Brazil, 17<sup>th</sup> – 26<sup>th</sup> July, 2017 Theme: "Our Mission: a Spirituality Without Borders."

The Lay Associates of the Brazilian Chevalier Family is organizing this meeting. They have invited 2 Associates and a spiritual mentor from each country to participate. Our Australia OLSH Associates will be represented by Mrs Ellenmary Lomman, Enfield (SA), and Mrs Therese Poulton, Mascot (NSW). I also have the privilege of attending as spiritual mentor.

The organizing committee expressed the aim of the meeting as follows:

"Beside the richness of personal meeting during these days, the main goal of our international meeting is to deepen our spirituality, so that the participants will be able to pass on this spirituality in a renewed way to their own groups."

This we hope to do in the months after the International Meeting when we will endeavor to visit as many groups as possible to share the fruits of this special event in our Chevalier Lay Associate Movement.

While most of the participants from the 52 countries will be able to manage their own costs some lay Associates are not in that position, and some countries will be unable to send participants because of financial hardship. If you are able to afford a small donation to help we would be very grateful. Without financial assistance Associates from the following countries will not be able to participate:

Columbia, DR Congo, El Salvador, Ecuador, Fiji, Futuna, Guatemala, India, Kiribati, Namibia, Peru, Papua New Guinea, Senegal, Slovakia, Venezuela, Vietnam.

An important matter to be discussed at the Meeting will be a Working Document entitled "Guidelines Regarding the Identity of the Lay Members of the Chevalier Family". In preparation for this discussion we have been asked to circulate the Document for your information, for your discussion and for your feedback. While this is readily done in the groups I would ask that those Associates who cannot attend a group would also give the paper some thought and from your own experience send feedback to me regarding it.

It is important that we look to the future of our Chevalier Associate Movement so that it be nurtured, formed and strengthened in all aspects of Father Chevalier's Charism to continue living out the dream that was his passion — that the Sacred Heart of Jesus be known and loved everywhere and forever.

# GUIDELINES REGARDING THE IDENTITY OF THE LAY MEMBERS OF THE CHEVALIER FAMILY

#### **INTRODUCTORY NOTE**

These guidelines are presented as a working document, in preparation for the General Assembly in Brazil in 2017. Local and national lay groups of the Chevalier Family will be invited to read these Guidelines critically, in order to make suggestions for improvement.

Suggestions will be presented to and taken into consideration by the General Assembly of the Chevalier Laity in Brazil 2017.

After confirmation by the General Assembly, the final text of these Guidelines will be made available to the <u>National Boards</u> which may use the Guidelines in composing their own Manual for the lay groups of the Chevalier Family in their country or region.

In the Manual these Guidelines may be elaborated and specified in accordance with the local situation and cultural needs.

These GUIDELINES will be followed by a second part presenting a concept of Statutes concerning the Organization of the lay-branch of the Chevalier Family. In these Statutes the role of the National Board and the General Assembly will be clarified, besides offering paragraphs regarding the role of the International Board, membership and finances. This Concept of Statutes will also be shared with the local lay groups of the Chevalier Family for comments, before being presented to the General Assembly for authorization.

#### 1. The Identity of the Laity of the Chevalier Family

We, the lay members of the Chevalier Family, are a communion of people, animated by a Spirituality of the Heart, which has its roots in the charism of the Founder, father Jules Chevalier.

Together with the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart, the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart and the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart, we belong to the Chevalier Family, and share the same Spirituality and Mission with Father Chevalier's religious families.

#### 2. Spirituality of the Heart

We believe in the healing power of God's unconditional love for every human being and all of creation, as revealed in the heart of Jesus Christ.

We draw strength from the *pierced* Heart of Jesus Christ as a source of new life and the birthplace of a new world.

We trust in the Holy Spirit who empowered Jesus Christ to love people unconditionally with a human heart. We also believe that the same Spirit enriches our hearts with gifts of love, gratefulness, joy, courage and faithfulness, as well as respect for every human being and creature.

In Mary, known as "Our Lady of the Sacred Heart", we discover a mother who leads us to the Heart of her Son.

Our motto is: "May the Sacred Heart of Jesus be loved everywhere."

#### 3. Mission

We participate in the mission of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit in the world, and are committed to live and spread a Spirituality of the Heart, as shown by the Heart of Jesus Christ.

The heart of Jesus was concerned about people, cared for their needs and took action accordingly. We experience that God has a heart for us too and sends us to be God's heart in the world. This commitment gives our lives meaning and content.

In our personal relationships, professional occupations and social engagements we try to make visible and real God's love and mercy, while particularly paying attention to the less fortunate in society.

#### 4. Sources we draw on:

- The Word of God by reading the Holy Scriptures.
- Jules Chevalier's Charism and his various writings, handed down to us.
- Papal Documents and other publications reflecting a Spirituality of the Heart.
- Personal and communal prayer.
- The counsel of a group whose members try to live a Spirituality of the Heart.



#### Section 20

#### The Healing of a Wounded Society

Pope Francis and Fr. Chevalier are both aware of the fact that the central message of the Gospel concerning God's unconditional love is received not only for our private consolation, but for the healing of a wounded society. In "Evangelli Gaudium" (EG), the Pope shows himself to be deeply conscious of the ills of modern society. He speaks extensively about the suffering of people and the big challenges faced by today's world: poverty, inequality, violence and war. He criticizes modern economies that disadvantage the poor. However, the Pope sees the root-causes of the appalling social inequality in today's society not only in failing economic systems, but also in maladies of the human heart.

Above all, he points to two illnesses: indifference and selfishness. He goes even so far as to speak of "a globalization of indifference" and declares: "Almost without being aware of it, we end up being incapable of feeling other people's pain, and feeling a need to help them, as though all this were not our responsibility" (EG n. 54). Regarding egoism, he urges all of us to say a firm "no to selfishness" (EG n. 81).

In his day, Fr. Chevalier felt himself upset by exactly the same social evils, rooted in the human heart. Two evils, he said, are "destroying our unhappy world: indifference and egoism" (Personal Notes, Appendix p. 107). He found "an effective remedy" (Daily Readings January 4), for these evils of the heart in the devotion to "the Sacred Heart of Jesus, which is all love and charity." Why? Because this devotion, he said, will "kindle in all hearts the fire of God's love found in the Heart of Jesus."

Pope Francis does not specifically mention the devotion to the Sacred Heart, but he also considers love and charity to be the remedies of today's social evils. Here he sees a role both for politicians and every private person. Politicians, he says, should get involved in "sincere and effective dialogue aimed at healing the deepest roots of the evils in our world," while all of us should be convinced that, "charity not only should shape our personal relationships with family, friends, and small groups, but also our social, economic and political relationships" (EG n. 205).

Several times, the Pope refers to "the inescapable social dimension of the Gospel message" (EG n. 258), which "before all else, invites us to respond to the God of love who saves us, … and to go forth from ourselves to seek the good of others" (EG n. 39).

#### A REFLECTIVE MOMENT

#### **Pope Francis writes:**

"The joy of the Gospel is such



Fr. Mark McDonald, Superior General of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart, wrote:

"The announcement that in the consistory of November 20, 2016, John Ribat, MSC, Archbishop of Port Moresby, would be created a cardinal of the Church was a moment of great joy. He is the first MSC Cardinal and the first Cardinal from Papua New Guinea.

His appointment underscores his own service of the Church in PNG

and his leadership on a number of moral and social issues. He adamantly opposes the death penalty

and is a proponent of simple life styles in order to protect the environment. His appointment brings our charism and spirituality

to the government of the universal Church and to the next conclave.

At the same time Cardinal Ribat's appointment is a testimony to the tireless work of so many people

- to proclaim the Gospel in the Pacific and to bear witness to God's merciful love everywhere and to all people. We can be justly proud of what our "Little Society" and the whole Chevalier

Sister Anne's labour of love, the Patakajiyali museum, shares valuable Tiwi stories, language and traditional customs, while also bringing financial benefit to the people.

Sister Tess Ward, our Provincial, spoke of how Sr Anne's naming as Senior Australian of the Year is another blessing from our God who daily manifests himself to us in so any ways:

"It is an occasion for gratitude and rejoicing in the beautiful charism we share, a gift from the Spirit through Jules Chevalier MSC.
