The following article was written by one of our Sydney Associates, Judith Carroll, and I thank Judith for her permission to include it in our Ametur. May it inspire us as we journey together through this special season of the Church's year – Lent.

THE SEASON of LENT YEAR C - 2019

We are fond of logos, schools, businesses, sporting clubs, community groups all use them to say, often superficially, "You belong to us, and we belong to each other." As we prepare to enter the Season of Lent, the Church presents us with a "logo." Not a very elegantly designed logo, the cruciform smudge of ash on our foreheads, but neither was the crucifixion of Jesus elegant. Nor is the cross of ash elegant, gentle and fragrant like the first cross that was traced on us with the Oils of Catechumens and Chrism at baptism.



Our first liturgical fingerprinting recorded our identity as "Christian," as one committed to living and dying and rising with Christ. The cross another brother or sister traces on us today is rougher, grittier, dirtier than the cross of baptismal oils, because that is how our lives have become. As we receive the ashes, the words of both options are stark and urgent: "Repent and believe in the gospel" or "Remember that you

are dust, and unto dust you shall return." Remember what Lent is all about.

The ritual of Ash Wednesday speaks of realities that our glossy personal and social masks usually try to hide, and perhaps so many people come to receive the ashes because it is a relief to admit in ritual what we find so difficult to put into words: that there are the "tears of things" within and around us: the grief and tragedy; the despair and deaths that are part of the dust and ashes of human life.

Ideally, people bring their last year's palms to the church on the Sunday before Ash Wednesday and incorporate the burning of these into the liturgy to provide the ashes with which they will be anointed in three days' time. Here are the palms that we held in our hands a year ago when on Palm Sunday we sang our "Hosannas." And yet we know that so often we have been unfaithful to the King we hailed and whose coming we called blessed.

Many times our commitment to Christ has become as insubstantial as ash. But, as those who live in bush-fire-prone areas know, ash is also the regenerating remnant of what was once alive and can again bring forth prolific new life. Many things that were once alive have probably died and turned to ash: loved ones have died, illness has struck, friendships have been broken, illusions about ourselves or others have been destroyed. It is out of such ashes that Christ will raise us up to a new life at Easter.

In the season of Lent, therefore, the Church calls us to traditional Christian practices: to prayer that is not wordy or ostentatious, to fasting that is not cosmetic but an expression of our action for and solidarity with those who hunger for justice, and to almsgiving that is not a hypocritical trumpeting of, or subtle hinting of our good works and generosity.

The Japanese have a beautiful proverb that says, "Something of the fragrance of the flowers lingers on the hands of the giver." Whatever we do in Lent should seep unobtrusively into our world of relationships, and yet it will also transform us with the lingering "fragrance that comes from knowing him" (2 Cor 2:14) and our attempts to live his mystery more deeply during this season.

Just as in every human birth there is the breaking of the waters and the flowing of blood, so it is when we have been carried in the womb of the Church through the days of Lent to the three-days feast of the Easter Triduum. In those days, for which all the Lenten days are a pregnancy, we will again participate in the mystery of our passage through the water and blood as we are reborn in the spirit of the risen Christ

Section 27 "May the Sacred Heart of Jesus be everywhere loved" (Third part)

Fr. Chevalier's book, "Le Sacré Coeur de Jésus" (the fourth edition appeared in 1900), opens with the words: "God is wholly love. God is love himself, essentially love (1 John 4:16). From all eternity God formed the plan of revealing to us this love... God sends his Word on earth, that is to say, God's only Son" (p. 3). This is a beautiful confession of faith, being foundational to Chevalier's spirituality during the last stage of his life, and to a contemporary Spirituality of the Heart as well. (See also section 10 of this course).

Yet, due to the theological climate of his time, Fr. Chevalier did not clearly recognize the other way God's love is powerfully at work among us, namely through the presence of the Holy Spirit in the universe, secular society and people's hearts. Sure, Chevalier acknowledged God's work in our hearts through, "the Spirit of power and love" (2 Tim 1:7; Le Sacré Coeur de Jésus, p. 201), but, while holding on to the teaching of the Church at the time, he saw God's Spirit only at work in the hearts of people baptized in the Roman Catholic Church. That made it difficult for him to discover any good, for example, in the hearts of a protestant reformer such as Luther, or contemporaries who campaigned for human rights.

Pope Francis expands our understanding of a Spirituality of the Heart by attributing an important role to "the Spirit which has its source in the heart of the risen Christ" (Evangelii Gaudium n. 2). Not unlike Fr. Chevalier, he draws our attention to God, who sends the "Spirit into our hearts", while making us "God's sons and daughters, transforming us and enabling us to respond to God's love by our lives" (Evangelii Gaudium n. 112). The Pope emphasizes as well how "the Holy Spirit also enriches the entire evangelizing Church with different charisms." These charisms or "Gifts of the Spirit" (see section 2 and 4 of this course), "are meant to renew and build up the Church" (Evangelii Gaudium n. 130).

What is more, the Pope urges us, "to believe that the Holy Spirit is at work in everyone." He declares, "that the Holy Spirit seeks to penetrate every human situation and all social bonds, knowing how to loosen the knots of the most complex human affairs" (Evangelii Gaudium n. 178). He states as well that, "the same Spirit everywhere brings forth various forms of practical wisdom, which help people to bear suffering and to live in greater peace and harmony" (Evangelii Gaudium n. 254). And so, "as Christians, we can also benefit from these treasures built up over many centuries," as they "can help us better to live our own beliefs" (Evangelii Gaudium n. 254).

Consequently, as "missionary disciples" (Evangelii Gaudium n. 119), who are used to praying, "May the Sacred Heart of Jesus be everywhere loved", we should let ourselves be taught by, "the Spirit which has its source in the heart of the risen Christ" (Evangelii Gaudium n. 2). We remember too, that it is this same Spirit which is powerfully active in the hearts of all people and in the entire secular society. (See Evangelii Gaudium n. 265). We are sent to "cooperate with the liberating work of the Spirit" (Evangelii Gaudium n. 178), in order to make Jesus and the yearnings of his heart, everywhere known and loved.

A Reflective Moment

"Keeping our missionary fervor alive calls for firm trust in the Holy Spirit, for it is he who "helps us in our weakness" (Rom 8:26).

But this generous trust has to be nourished, and so we need to invoke the Spirit constantly.

He can heal whatever causes us to flag in the missionary endeavor.

It is true that this trust in the unseen can cause us to feel disoriented: it is like being plunged Into the deep and not knowing what we will find.

Yet there is no greater freedom than that of allowing oneself to be guided by the Holy Spirit,

renouncing the attempt to plan and control everything to the last detail, and instead letting him enlighten, guide and direct us, leading us wherever he wills.

The Holy Spirit knows well what is needed in every time and place." (Pope Francis, Evangelii Gaudium, n. 280).

Steering Committee News

In Issue 328, May-June 2018, pages 7-11 of the *Ametur* you would have read the **General Guiding Principles and Statutes of the Laity of the Chevalier Family** which were officially approved by the General Assembly, Sao Paulo, Brazil, Saturday July 22, 2017. You might remember that the Document is in two sections: The first offers inspiration in our living out of the Charism, while the second is concerned with organizational matters. Every country in which there are Laity of the Chevalier Family has been asked to set up a National Council for the implementation of these organizational matters, adapted to its own culture.

Following on from a meeting of representative members of the MSC and OLSH Laity on 4th March 2018, at Douglas Park, a small Steering Committee was set up "to help guide the Australian province of MSC, OLSH and MSC Sisters and wider Chevalier Family in a response to the Guidelines document approved by the General Assembly of the Laity of the Chevalier Family, July 2017" (taken from the Minutes of the Steering Committee Meeting, 8th April, 2018). The express purpose of the group has been to produce a proposal for the establishment and operation of a National Council of the Laity of the Chevalier Family of the Australian Provinces of MSC, FDNSC, and MSC Sisters.

This Steering Committee comprises four members of the MSC Laity, one MSC Priest, and four OLSH Associates. The members have worked steadily and generously during the past months and have called on the wisdom of others including an MSC and OLSH Canon Lawyer. The Proposal is almost ready, and it won't be long before you hear more about this important historical event in the life of Father Chevalier's special dream for the inclusion of the Laity in the Chevalier Family. Let me thank the group, under the leadership of Fred Stubenrauch for this important preparatory work towards the formation of the first National Council. Please keep all this in your good prayers.

Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation

From the Sub-Committee of the Council on Justice – Rome JPIC *CHEVALIER FAMILY* – Letter 6 – Spring 2019



"Thousands of teenagers in Belgium took part in another student strike action for climate change on Thursday (Jan 30), following similar protests in recent weeks. A reported 30.000 people skipped classes for the marches held in Brussels, Liege and Leuven, included primary school pupils. A number of children demonstrated outside the home of Belgium Environment Minister ahead of the event. 3.000 academics have backed up the protests, saying 'the activists were absolutely right'."

With these words and a photo, Oscar-winning

actor, Leonardo DiCaprio, supported on his Instagram account this action to awaken our politicians. With his Foundation he himself is already a climate activist for many years. On two Sundays during this Winter season more than 60.000 people were in the EU capital to show their concern about the apparent lack of ambition in the political world to take effective action for radical change 'before it is too late'. A 17-year-old girl started the wakeup call and 3.455 academics – among them Vice Chancellors of universities and important climate experts such as Jean Pascal van Ypersele – invited not only the decision makers but each one of us to think globally and to act now on climate. She walked out of school and organized a strike, protesting outside the Swedish parliament. To hear her speak go to;

This is a "momentum" where the Chevalier Family cannot be absent! Not only is there Laudato Si (2013) as an urgent appeal of Pope Francis to all people of goodwill, but also the Paris Agreement, the Global Covenant of Mayors – that as a Network of more than 9000 cities is fighting climate change – that contributed to create a sense of urgency. Other networks are now gaining increasing influence: Cities4Climate and Energy Cities. After Trump's decision to leave the Paris Agreement several American states, like New York and California, together with cities and industries, formed the counter – coalition, We Are Still In.

The first question put by some "Who is going to pay?" is a false diversion of our vigilance. For sure, climate change asks for huge investments, but it also generates profits and it will benefit future generations. Climate related disasters caused about 300-billion-euro damage in 2017 and the *WHO* calculated that in Europe pollution costs yearly more than 1.6 trillion dollars. Two hundred species are in danger of becoming extinct. Greta Thunberg said it clearly: "we have all the facts and solutions. All we have to do is to wake up and change". We have had thirty years of pep-talk ... Now action and only action will give hope!

There is a sense of urgency we should be aware of. When the French Provincial, Fr. Daniel Auguié, was in Port Moresby last year, he had a very interesting interview with our MSC Cardinal John Ribat. In previous letters I've mentioned how much the Cardinal is committed in these matters and advocates, where he can, effective action on global warming. The full text was published in the Provincial Bulletin "Entre Nous". He also speaks about social justice at a world-wide level and about how mining companies are destroying their environment, but this 'hot issue' is for another letter. Please, read here a paragraph of the interview:

"That's why I think it's right, good and necessary for someone here to take those issues and bring them to the governments here and around the world.

And what I defend most vigorously is the hierarchy of considerations.

In this part of the world, we live in islands, archipelagos, and we are the first concerned by the rise of the sea level, and the global warming of the planet.

By 2050, many islands will be gone.
Papua New Guinea is already seeking shelter for
the islanders who will be affected in the next few years.
I recently visited two of our islands, including Andra.
They are building dikes. This island has about 700 inhabitants.

The living space diminish visibly. They showed me how far their island was before.

A huge part is already submerged. We went around the island on foot in twenty minutes.

The question is simple: what will we do when this island is completely gone?

Currently, most locals say they will ask relatives or relatives who live in this or that island to welcome them.

But we know that this is not the solution because these other islands will disappear too.
This is a gigantic problem, because global warming will not spare any archipelago, no island.
It will affect us all. But this first question posed by the observation of the effects of warming, brings another question as to its causes.

When we talk to people in the islands, they ask us,
"Why does this happen? There was nothing to let us foresee ..."
Some of them now hear, and understand that this is actually
the result of gas emissions throughout the planet,
and in particular from industrialized countries.
The people of the Pacific are coming together today to demand the removal of
greenhouse gas emissions from the atmosphere
and a change in lifestyle around the world."

What can we do as a Chevalier Family?

"... a change of lifestyle around the world", the removal of greenhouse gas emissions will be a consequence of it. No doubt a lot of things are happening. We just ignore what is being done around the world. In a previous letter I mentioned already the biological farming in our mission of Steinerskirche (S. Germany). The MSC Centre for the Poor in Butuan (Mindanao, Philippines) runs livelihood projects to promote organic and healthy products which allows micro-entrepreneurs to legitimate food suppliers while funneling any extra income to social service projects. It has a program for organic agriculture and zero waste

management. The centre promotes explicitly an alternative and sustainable lifestyle. We are urged by Pope Francis to hear not only the cry of the poor but also the cry of the earth. Last year as a result of the Cor America course on MSC spirituality a JPIC Commission for the Chevalier Family was erected! Sr. Diva (OLSH) is the coordinator. Isn't that encouraging? Congratulations and welcome, let us know about your concerns and initiatives. Fr. Norbert Becker (Germany) provided us with a Justice & Peace song in English, you can find it at the end of: www.olshgen.org. More musical accompaniment has been promised.

Once more we invite the Chevalier Family to connect each month to Facebook https://m.facebook.com/FDNSC where you'll find a prayer in 3 languages for the first Friday and each month a suggestion for action. Last February we reached already 847 people! Feel free to develop an action more adapted to the needs of your own environment.

It remains our main purpose to build up a network among us. A huge challenge is to foster communication in the Chevalier Family. Share with others what you are involved in, what is important for you or your JPIC group. How can we help one another more effectively? Thanks for all you are doing to make the world a better place!

CANBERRA: We met at St Matthew's Church, Page on 2nd February. We began with a reflection on the Divine Communion of Love. The feasts of Christmastide celebrate some aspects of the revelation of God in the person of Jesus Christ. Christmas celebrates Christ's revelation to Israel. What would be our response?
